We would like to thank the shelter's volunteers and staff for the hard work that has been done during this years "kitten season"!

Every springtime and into the summer months, The Humane Society of Yuma receives a large amount of neonatal puppies and kittens. And each year the shelter makes urgent pleas for assistance to save those tiny babies. These "bottle babies", as we like to call them, have for one reason or another, been abandoned or separated from their mother. It is crucial for these babies to receive the necessary nutrients and direct care that they would typically receive from their mother. SUMMER SAFETY TIP

During the summer months is when our pets are at the highest risk of getting heat stroke, so it is extremely crucial to take the proper precautions to protect them. For exercise and bathroom walks, the best time of day to take them would be early morning and late evening. It is important to remember that the concrete may still be hot even after the sun is down. If the animal needs to be walked during the day, it is recommended that they be kept in the shade and not walked on concrete, sand, pavement, metal, and stone since these surfaces can reach extreme temperatures.

It is always best to leave your pet at home, no matter how long you intend to be gone. Oftentimes our "quick" stop at a store can turn into several minutes and can become dangerous for our pets when they are in our vehicles. We know how much pets love to go for rides, but what if your pet accidentally hits the off on the air conditioner when you are out? Or maybe your car has an issue and it shuts off without you knowing? These situations can be life threatening for your pet.

If you think your pet is overheated or possibly suffering from heat stroke, we recommend you contact your Veterinarian immediately and follow their advice for the best ways to help your pet cool down as safely and quickly as possible.

The heat is not the only danger we see in the summer in Arizona. Snakes are also on the top of our list of dangers to your pets. Because of the

heat, Yuma locals will often be seen walking early in the morning or late at night.

Since this time is probably the coolest time to get your pet out of the house, the cool weather may entice snakes to be out moving around as well. Please be sure to know exactly where your pet is at all times and do not allow them off of their leash when you are in an area where snakes might be. Curious dogs will often find themselves with a pretty nasty snake bite for sticking their noses in the wrong place at the wrong time. If you believe your pet has been bitten by a rattlesnake please see your local Veterinarian immediately. Snake bites are quite painful and can be life threatening very quickly.

IT TAKES A COMMUNITY



The Humane Society of Yuma's Community Cat Program is a vital part of our lifesaving work and has proven to be an amazingly effective way to humanely reduce the numbers of cats entering our shelter. Shelters and animal welfare groups across the country have implemented a community cat program with very successful outcomes. Trap-Neuter-Return, TNR, manages community cat colonies by spaying or neutering these cats, tipping one of their ears and then returning them to where they were trapped.

The management of this life-saving program is overseen by the Humane Society of Yuma's Community Cat Coordinator, Kat Davison. Kat tracks the colonies and helps manage surgery days for the community cat caregivers that take care of the colony of cats. The graph depicts the number of cats that have entered the shelter since implementing our TNR program. Along with a decrease in cats and kittens entering the shelter, the amount of cats and kittens euthanized has also greatly decreased.

The Humane Society of Yuma decided this model was best for our community and the cats that live in it. Catching cats and euthanizing them was just not working. Not only was it upsetting to the staff and community members, but the number of cats in our community continued to grow exponentially every single year. We believe that our community is ok with the cats being around, they just don't want them showing those bad behaviors that come with an unaltered cat.

MOMMA KNOWS BEST!

Every spring hundreds and hundreds of baby kittens come into the Humane Society of Yuma. From spring through summer, HSOY sees no shortage of feline friends of all sizes and ages. Since kitten season is weather dependent, places like Yuma tend to have longer kitten seasons and it is not uncommon to see kittens born in their "off-season".

When baby kittens enter the shelter at hours, to a few days old, they are dependent on bottle feeding and the Humane Society of Yuma's goal is to save everyone that comes into the shelter. Some who come into the shelter are in need of medical care, such as fluids if they are dehydrated and antibiotics or eye ointments if they have an infection brewing. Sometimes just giving them some karo syrup and food is all they need to get on their feet.

In the past couple years the Humane Society of Yuma has advocated to leave kittens where they are. We understand that it is hard to walk away from a newborn kitten whose mom is not within our sights. More often than not though very plump, happy kittens are

brought into the shelter by well meaning community members. These kittens have been cared for by someone or something to make them look as good as they do. The Humane Society of Yuma can only care for so many cats and kittens at a time before the shelter becomes an unsafe place for all cats.

The shelter has three community cat rooms that can hold approximately 15 kittens. A kitten nursery that can hold approximately 18 cats with babies or kittens and our cat adoption floor which can hold around 30 cats or kittens. In April, May and June of 2021 the shelter unwanted. With space for only 68 cats, housing and caring for that many is not only rough on the shelter but also on those cats that we are caring for. Cats, much like humans, will get sick if they are around other sick cats or if they are stressed for long periods of time. The shelter has done everything we can to make our cat friends as comfortable as possible but in the end, cats want to be outside roaming in their own space, not in a kennel; and definitely not with other cats they do not know.

You can help HSOY mitigate the high numbers of kittens and cats that come through the shelter by helping us spread our message to family, friends, co-workers and using your social media to remind our community when they find a kitten or kittens, to leave them alone. Mother cats often leave for hours at a time to search for food or new shelter. Keeping kittens with their mother and putting both mom and adolescent kittens into the TNR program is their best chance at survival. Learn more at www.hsoyuma.com/articles.html



MEET OUR CANINE BEHAVIOR SPECIALIST JESSICA JOHNSTON



Jessica Johnston has been training dogs since she was in third grade. She is involved in a variety of dog sports like flyball, dock diving, personal protection and obedience. She moved to Yuma in February of 2020 from San Diego California. Jessica is certified dog behaviorist, a veterinary assistant and has worked at a groom shop, emergency vet office, dog trainer, and sport dog training kennel.

What does a Behavior Specialist do?

The Humane Society of Yuma gets over 7,000 animals a year. We often get dogs that haven't had any socializing with people or other dogs. As a Behavior Specialist, I assess the dogs that enter the shelter and set up an action plan catered to the animal's needs. By doing this, the dog is better socialized, behavior issues are worked out, and a deeper understanding of the dog's personality is developed before leaving for its forever home.

Do you only help dogs that are in the shelter, do you help cats?

Cats and dogs are very different animals. Much of my time is spent working with dogs as their aggression and behavior are often more detrimental to their adoption than cats are. However, on occasion, I do get to spend some time with a frightened kitty who needs some socialization. The primary behavior problem in cats within the shelter often revolves around socialization. On occasion we get both dogs and

cats turned over to the HSOY because their owners are unsure of how to deal with a personality problem in their pet. For families in need, we may offer consultations to help them keep their pets at home rather than turn them over. And since the majority of cats and dogs that come through our doors are strays, we don't know what may trigger their behavior. I work with new pet parents, adopting both dogs and cats, to help them with the obstacles they may face. By recognizing those key triggers and finding solutions, we hope to create a smooth transition from the shelter to home life.

What is the most rewarding part of your job?

I find the most rewarding aspect to be observing a dog's true personality, and perhaps even seeing it play for the first time. We don't know much about an animal's past as a stray or about their life before they came to the shelter. One of the most valuable and heartwarming things about rehabilitating them is seeing them go home after they have become the dog they were always meant to be.

the Registered Veterinary Technician exam in California. In 2009, he moved from general practice and emergency medicine, to shelter medicine. At that time he began working towards obtaining his Veterinary License in the United States but he first needed to complete multiple exams through the Educational Commission for Foreign Veterinary Graduates. Once he passed his ECFVG certification in 2019, he was able to sit for the California State Veterinary Board Exam and the National Veterinary Licensing Exam.

The HSOY staff was thrilled to have Dr. Manzon join the clinic team as Director of Veterinary Services. Born and raised in the Philippines, Dr. Manzon received his Doctorates at the De La Salle Araneta University. Following his graduation in 2005, Dr. Manzon came to the United States to rejoin his family who moved here in 2003. Unfortunately, De La Salle Araneta University is not an accredited Veterinary school in the United States. Therefore, Dr. Manzon worked as a veterinary assistant but quickly became eligible to sit for

Dr. Manzon received his Veterinary License and ability to practice medicine in the State of California in January of 2020 and Arizona in May of 2020. He worked as a General Practitioner and Shelter Veterinarian. In November of the same year, he was voted as The Best Veterinarian in South County (California) from a local news station called Star News. His interests at work lie in surgical procedures, internal medicine and shelter medicine.

Outside of his time at the Humane Society of Yuma, Dr. Manzon spends

his days with his wife Monica and their two boys. Since Monica is a Certified Veterinary Technician herself, they have already adopted one Kitten and fostered many others. In all their spare time they love hanging out with their pets and watching basketball. Dr. Mark also loves helping at the Chula Vista Animal Shelter, Otay Pet Vets and a Spay/Neuter Clinic in Mexico.

FEBRUARY 2021



The future of animal welfare actually has everything to do with our younger generation of children. HSOY believes that we need to teach children kindness towards animals. compassion for their survival, and the respect for the habitat that we share with animals. HSOY's Junior Camp Counselor program was a new feature this year. This volunteer youth program aimed to provide leadership and responsibility-based life skill development

of the happiest little girls you'll ever meet. As you can see in her picture, her name fits her well. Then we have "Oz Man" or "Ozzy". Ozzy came to the shelter in October 2018 and became an instant member at his new family's home. He loves meeting all the children and teaching them about responsible

pet ownership. Finally, meet "Stuart"! He entered the shelter in December of 2019. "Stuart" found his forever home and now loves going to schools to teach all the children about shelter animals and proper ways to care for their pets.









WHAT IS HOME-TO-HOME?

Home-To-Home™ provides a new conversation around the issue of pet surrender that is positive and supportive.



Home-to-Home is a new program that the Humane Society of Yuma launched with the primary goal of keeping animals out of the shelter. The success of this program is yet to be fully measured. But we know Home-to-Home gives people, who can no longer keep their pets, the opportunity to find new, loving homes without having to surrender their pets to the shelter. Pets are able to be re-homed by going from one home directly into another home without HSOY intervention. These animals in need of new homes can be found on our website. The benefits of using Home-to-Home is that it reduces the stress on animals by keeping them out of the shelter and it allows us here at the Humane Society of Yuma to offer more shelter resources to animals with no other options – for example: stray, abandoned, and/or neglected animals.

Since the launch of Home-to-Home, 173 animals have been published to our

website, 52 of which were re-homed using the web-based platform, and 26 were eventually surrendered to HSOY. Using Home-to-Home also gives potential new pet owners a chance to learn more about the animals directly from the current owners. We are looking forward to this program becoming a more utilized resource for families who can no longer keep their animals in their home.


RAVE TO HSOY'S KENNEL TEAM

VOLUNTEER MANAGER AND FOSTER COORDINATOR


