continuing to add pressure and stress on our already limited resources. With our new model, many of the cats that enter the shelter unaltered and possibly feral will be

sterilized, vaccinated and receive an ear Thus far, over 700 cats have been returned back into the community sterilized because of this new program.




As we study feral cats, we have learned that these cats are very territorial and will only allow their


"family" into their colony. If the entire family is sterilized they will keep all the other cats out and no longer would kittens be born every six to eight months, consistently increasing the size of the colony. This sterilized colony will eventually die off naturally over time. The cats that are not sterilized, are not welcomed into the colony and

will move on to another place that has unaltered cats and a food source. The goal of the Humane Society of Yuma is to sterilize as many community cats in Yuma County as possible. This

will greatly decrease the population of lost or unwanted cats running in neighborhoods and densely populated areas, as well as decrease the amount of cats that enter the shelter every day.

The Humane Society of Yuma would like to thank Best Friends Animal Society for all their assistance. Additionally, Feline Friends continues to be an instrumental part in altering thousands of cats in Yuma County. We hope that through their continued efforts and that of HSOY, we will eventually eliminate the need to euthanize cats due to overpopulation.

BY THE NUMBERS


The Humane Society of Yuma is very excited about the progress that has been made in the past five and a half years here A at the shelter and in Yuma County. We believe these incredible results are attributed to many factors which include:

- Spay/neuter services
- Increasing return to owner compliance through microchips and licensing
- Our wonderful volunteers and community members who are proactive with posting pictures and helping the staff match lost animals with animals that have entered
- the shelter
- The rescue organizations across the state that have chosen our organization to work with
- The community's support of the Humane Society of Yuma in the form of donations and adoptions

"NO-KILL" STATUS

According to Best Friends Animal Society (who is leading the "no-kill" movement in the animal welfare industry), achieving a "no-kill" status means that 90% or more of the animals who have entered the shelter have been released alive. As you can see by our statistics, HSOY has maintained

this status for TWO full years with our canine population. Although we have much more work to do with the cats that enter into our care, we have made huge strides in moving towards the "no-kill" status with cats as well.



Managed Admissions vs. Limited Admissions

Open Admissions vs.

Open Admission shelters have an "open-door" policy. Traditionally they are operated by municipalities or are private shelters that hold animal control contracts for municipalities. They intake all stray animals from animal control agencies and community members, in addition to owner-surrendered pets, regardless of the pet's health condition, adoptability or the shelter's resources.

In Managed Admission shelters, the intakes of animals that are surrendered by their owners are scheduled by appointment in order to match the flow of animals coming into the facility to the available space and resources. Shelters differ in the services or alternatives they offer during the waiting period until intake can be accomplished. Managed admission shelters may also hold animal control or municipal contracts by which they must maintain open admission policies for animals subject to such agreements.

Admission shelters are typically privately-funded shelters without municipal roles or animal control contracts. As a private organization, the shelter may accept animals based on self-defined criteria and mission. Because they are not publicly funded, limited admission shelters are under no obligation to take stray animals, and often focus on services for ownersurrendered animals.

HSOY'S UNIQUE CHALLENGES

The Humane Society of Yuma is the one and only animal shelter in Yuma County, servicing over 5,500 square miles of Arizona's Southwest border.

The Humane Society of Yuma is an open admissions **shelter**, contracted with the following entities:



unique is that we are

the only animal shelter in Yuma County and we are an open admissions shelter. We take all of the sick, injured, lost and unwanted animals to include feral or community cats; never is a domesticated pet turned away. Traditionally, "no-kill" was only seen in shelters that limited or managed admissions or shelters that only allowed a certain number of animals whose adoptability was high. Animals that were less desirable were turned away, forcing those animals into open admissions shelters.

ATTENTION: YUMA COUNTY DOG OWNERS

As of July 1st, 2018 all Yuma County Pet (dog) Licenses will be switching over to a rolling year schedule.

Yuma County Rabies Licensing will no longer be subject to a December 31st expiration date. All licenses issued after June 30th will be "valid for 12 months, unless anti-rabies vaccine expires earlier" [Yuma County Ordinance]. All dogs living in Yuma County are required by Arizona state law and Yuma County Ordinance to be licensed. Multi-year licenses are available.

Pet licenses are exclusively related to the Rabies vaccine's due dates and cannot be issued without a signed Rabies Vaccination Certificate by a Veterinarian licensed in the United States. "Pet Licenses ensure that your animal has been vaccinated for Rabies. Though we have not had any cases of Rabies in humans, we did see a case of Rabies last year involving a bat and in 2012 a case involving a fox. It is important to understand that we have not seen a case of Rabies in humans because the citizens of Yuma County are mostly compliant with properly vaccinating their pet and we need to ensure that continues," Diana Gomez, Director of Public Health, Yuma County.

Walk-in Vaccine Clinics are

available at the shelter's low-cost clinic and owners can purchase their license at the time of the visit. "Rabies in animals and humans is fatal. The Humane Society of Yuma is aware of the public's desire to have their pets fully vaccinated. We have tried to ensure that our lowcost vaccines clinic is accessible and affordable to local residents so that compliance with state and local ordinances is possible and our pets are healthy," stated Annette Lagunas, Executive Director. Humane Society of Yuma.

*City of Yuma Residents will not be affected by this new ordinance.

PETSMART DONATIONS 730 CATS

Our friendly felines and canines at the shelter got a big bulk of donations (cat towers, cat toys, kong toys, and etc.) from Petsmart Charities Inc.

Because of the help from Best Friends and the hard work from Bill, our Community Cat Coordinator, we have been able to TNR 730 feral cats from Jan-June '18; 424 cats from Feline Friends and 306 cats from the shelter have been returned to the field.

GROWING

The BEHUMANE program and the summer camps this year are expanding to reach more children. BEHUMANE is going to be in at least seven schools this year.

MINI FACELIFT

Our thrift store has welcomed new management, Opal. With a new face is coming a mini facelift with new signage inside the store.



CATS WIN!

From January 2018 through June 2018, the rescue program has sent more cats to rescue than dogs. 540 animals have gone already this year.

POWER IN MANPOWER

HSOY has deepened our involvement with the Arizona Department of Corrections to expand our inmate crew volunteers to include work on the weekends, relieving some stress on staff and volunteers.

NEW PARTNERSHIPS

We have developed some great new partnerships with local businesses, such as Buffalo Wild Wings, and with organizations like the Yuma Art Center in efforts to raise more money for the Humane Society of Yuma.


FOSTER FOCUSED

BEHUMANE COMING TO A SCHOOL NEAR YOU



Summer Camp was a success with 95 enrollments; this summer was filled with fun activities and more animal interactions. Although dogs and cats had regular



appearances, we had some special appearances from rats to reptiles expanding their pet experiences and learning more about different kinds of domesticated pets.

Each week focused on different animal welfare topics, which gave the kids multiple opportunities to participate with something different. The campers "adopted" animals, became animal whisperers by learning how to communicate with animals and how they communicate with us. Animal experts came to share their experiences and gave the campers insight on their animal careers as well as inspiring the campers to be animal advocates. In session 6, the campers learned more about the Humane Society of Yuma specifically and the effort it takes to get animals adopted, spreading the message and to inspire people through marketing efforts to spay/neuter their pets.


